

5.4.7 ARTS CENTER, GREENSBURG, KS

The 5.4.7 Arts Center in Greensburg, Kansas is a non-profit organization dedicated to raising awareness of both visual and performing arts and providing an environment to create and learn through exhibits, performances and classes. As one of the few public arts centers between Wichita and Dodge City, it serves as an important regional resource for contemporary art in Southwestern Kansas.

The Center's name comes from the date on which a Category 5 tornado devastated nearly all of Greensburg

on May 4, 2007. After the tornado, the community made the decision to designate art as an essential part of the city's social and economic redevelopment by choosing to build 5.4.7 Arts Center as its first public building.

Designed and built in 2008 by Studio 804, a non-profit organization of graduate architecture students from the University of Kansas, it is the first building in Kansas to receive a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Platinum rating and exemplifies Greensburg's commitment to rebuild as an entirely 'green' town.

At the 5.4.7 Arts Center, we offer 6-8 gallery exhibits each year, art classes of all media for children and adults, annual wine and beer tasting fundraising events, and much more! We are always looking for talented artists to exhibit in our gallery. Please contact us if you are interested!

Tips from the Columbian Artists



Terry Mulhern:

1.) A cookbook holder works great as a tabletop easel. Bulldog clips will hold a watercolor painting on the wall so

you can view it from a distance.

- 2.) I use a jewelry (many zippers on both sides) hanging bag to place my watercolor tube paints in. I can see them all at just a glance, colors are grouped in each section. Since they are zipped I can roll it up and tote it easily. I can hang it in easy reach (like on the back of my chair or on a door knob) and do not need to use shelf or table space.
- 3.) Old watercolor tubes:* I can get them open with a match heating the lid, but if they are still hard inside, use something to grip the top and dip the tube up to its neck in hot water. Often the paint starts coming forth so be ready.

If they are beyond that stage-(hard as a rock), slit the tube open and use as you would a pan watercolor. I still use some from the 70's and haven't been accused of using dull colors yet.


In my personal life I have sought to capture all the moments of my childhood; that of my children's, and now, my grandchildren's.


